In writing my *Lach Lecha* CBI newsletter column, each December, I strive to come up with a helpful thought, a bit of wisdom, which might help us better navigate the coming year.

Looking back over the past year, I do not believe that I am being unfairly negative or unduly critical when I say that 2023 was an unusually challenging one in many ways. Internationally, we experienced the ongoing war in Ukraine; domestically, the continuing attacks on democracy and civility, and as Jews, the October 7<sup>th</sup> massacre, the Israeli/Hamas war, and the resulting sharp spike in Antisemitism in our country, especially on our college campuses.

It appears, unfortunately, that many of these challenges remain unresolved and are thus going to accompany us into the year 2024. One important way for us to keep our grounding, not despair, and maintain hope, despite all these challenges, serves as the theme of my column this month.

With our coming from a religious tradition that likes to use stories and *midrash* to teach important life lessons, I am now going to share several personal stories to hopefully make more clear the lesson that I hope to teach in my column this month.

1<sup>st</sup> Story. As a child, assuming I had satisfactorily completed my chores, kept up my grades, and not gotten into too much trouble during the prior week, I could look forward, each Sunday, to receiving my weekly allowance from my parents. The first thing that I would typically do with my allowance would be to walk excitedly to the local "mom and pop" pharmacy/drug store in our neighborhood and buy several packs of baseball cards. I would spend a good chunk of my hard-earned allowance week after week, all year long, knowing full well that most of the cards in a pack were of relatively nondescript players, players whose cards would be immediately consigned, when I arrived home, to my "schmata" baseball card pile.

Why, then, you might ask, did I, as a 6, 7, and 8 year-old, spend so much of my hard-earned allowance each week buying packs of baseball cards? Yes, there was the one large, thin, square piece of gum that came in every pack, but this piece of gum so quickly lost its sweet taste that I would immediately put it in a paper towel, when I got home, and deep six it; and, yes, there were those rare occasions, when I would be able to take advantage of a less experienced card collector and convince him to part with one of his "star" player cards for perhaps 10 of the cards from my "schmata" pile.

No, the main reason that I spent so much of my hard-earned allowance each week buying baseball cards was that every once-in-a-while there would be the card of a really great player, a player like Warren Spahn or Sandy Koufax. I would be equally, if not even more, excited, if I came upon the card of a starting player on my (then) beloved Red Sox, a player like Jimmy Piersall and Mel Parnell. These cards, unlike those cards relegated to the "schmata" file, were more valuable than gold to me, with each being placed for protection in its own plastic holder, which holders I would then clip into a large 3 ring binder I had purchased with my allowance money.

2<sup>nd</sup> Story. I gave up collecting baseball cards a long time ago, but I have found other ways, as an adult, to derive joy and satisfaction by looking for and every-once-in-a-while finding a "diamond in the rough." One of my "go to" sections of the New York Times is the "Metropolitan Diary Section." This section contains personal stories and anecdotes submitted by readers of the Times describing a particular experience they have had in "The Big Apple."

In the same way that I derived great joy, as a child, finding that one card in every pack or two of a star and/or Red Sox player, I derive a similar joy, today, when I find that one vignette, of the 5 or 6 short stories appearing in each "Metropolitan Diary," that touches my heart or perhaps causes me break out in a big guffaw.

The following story appeared, for example, in a recent "Metropolitan Diary" Section. The person submitting the story makes his living operating a popular whale watching cruise, each evening in the summer, out of Sheepshead Bay. He writes that one of his closest friends, Buddy, died recently, and with Buddy having asked him to spread his ashes over Sheepshead Bay, the writer decides to honor his friend by canceling one of his evening cruises and, instead, holding a private memorial service for Buddy on his boat.

The writer says that he was thus extremely pleased, when a goodly number of Buddy's family and friends boarded the boat, on a beautiful summer evening, to offer their last goodbye. Among the passengers was a woman, the writer notes, who sat by herself, with a serious look on her face. The memorial service was marked with funny stories about Buddy, a few tears being shed, and Buddy's ashes being spread over the Bay. When the boat returned to the dock in Brooklyn, as each person disembarked, the writer/captain thanked the person for making the evening so special. When he thanked the woman, who had been sitting by herself, and whom he had not met before, she responded, "Honestly, Captain, I've got to tell you, this was the worst whale watch cruise I have ever been on!"

The message that I hope these stories convey is a simple, but profound one, as we welcome in the secular new year, this message being, that despite whatever serious challenges may exist, we Jews have always made it a point to seek out the good and the positive in our lives and in the world and then to have gratitude for whatever these gifts and blessings may be.

I close with a third personal anecdote hopefully conveying this same message. As some of you may know, I have been struggling the past several weeks with a painful case of sciatica, necessitating my having to greatly limit my activities. With my not being the greatest of patients—the Hebrew word for "patient" comes from a root meaning "to suffer" — and with all that has been going on in our country and in the world, I was feeling more than a little down this past week. All of a sudden, the phone rang, and based on the way that I was feeling, I was not sure that I wanted to talk with anyone at that time. I decided that it might be work related, so I did answer the call.

It was my son, Charlie, and his wife, Marissa, facetiming me. Isaac had just taken his first steps on his own, and they wanted me to see him in action. Suddenly, a feeling of joy replaced the sciatica pain that I have been feeling, and the events of the world that have been waying me down suddenly became much less important!

May the secular new year, 2024, be a year of good health for all of us, and may we feel gratitude for the gifts and blessings in our lives!

## MESSAGE OF THE MONTH FROM THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

The war in Israel with Hamas has been raging for nearly 3 months. It is a fierce war with loss and tragedy omnipresent. As Jews living in America, on soil more than 5,000 miles away from Israel, many of our hearts and souls are united in the struggle, trying to find ways to support their existential crisis. We recognize the profound loss of security the Israelis feel living in their land. We try to understand the pain they must be enduring, while we live in the comfort of our homes. As the toll of lost lives rise in Gaza we try to grapple with this loss through our Jewish lens, which teaches us to protect a life at all costs except in self-defense. We see on the TV, these ordinary Gazans crying and grieving over the loss of loved ones as they grope the body bags of their deceased. I know these images and thoughts are constantly ruminating within me leaving me feeling sorrowful, angry along with some guilt. I am constantly feeling and thinking of my Jewish roots and identity.

Just as we, in America, are contemplating our Jewish identity, perhaps more intensely the Israelis are contemplating their identity. In the New York Times this week, there was an article entitled, "Oct 7 Is Forcing Israelis to Rethink their Identities as a People and a Nation". It quotes an Israeli author, Dorit Rabinyan, and her thoughts of identity, "It felt like 75 years of sovereignty of Israeliness, had in a snap disappeared. Before Oct 7, we used to be Israelis, Now we are Jewish". I interpret this as a statement from the secular Israelis, who had shorn their religion to create a new identity for themselves. It would be an identity of building a strong nation together and securing safety for themselves. Never again would they find themselves as victims of pogroms or anti-Semitism, but sadly this is what they faced on Oct. 7<sup>th</sup>. Now they struggle with this reality. The article also speaks of more unity in the segments of society such as the religious, Haredim, and the secular and to some extent the Arab Israeli. There has been an increase of the Haredim serving in the army about 2,000 have joined the army since Oct 7th which is about 1% of the 360,000 reservists. Typically, the Haredim shun the army but there has been more acceptance perhaps, recognizing a duty to help in protection and security of the state. The article describes, since Oct 7<sup>th</sup>, many Israelis are "struggling to even empathize with the Gazans let alone retain hope for a peaceful solution to the conflict". The article quotes another author, Yossi Klein Halevi, who wrote a book in 2018, "Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor" where he tried to imagine a future of a shared life of Arabs and Jews. He says as an observant Jew, he prays for the Palestinians but "more from duty than from empathy". He says, "I tried to find a space where both could live together, I don't have the language right now, It's emotionally unavailable to me." This is painfully sad to lose empathy, but it is totally understood since the Israelis feel sabotaged on many levels.

These are difficult times, and while we are soul searching, we each need to find ways to cope, find a thread of positivity. and beauty in this world. I believe we are fortunate to have our small, intimate CBI community, where we can share our thoughts and feelings safely in our compassionate and supportive Kehilah. In this vein, we want to wish everyone a 2024 in which we lean on each other and bolster one another as we navigate these times and move from strength to strength!



The Social Action Committee has created a fundraiser to support HIAS's work to provide relief in Ukraine. We have already made \$200 in donations, and hope to raise an additional \$550 for a total of \$750.

According to HIAS's website:

The UN Refugee Agency reports that more than 5 million refugees have fled Ukraine to Europe since the war began, making it the fastest-moving refugee crisis in Europe since the end of WWII. UNHCR says there are more than 6 million internally displaced people in Ukraine and around 15 million people have been affected in the areas hardest hit by the war within Ukraine and are in need of humanitarian and protection assistance.

HIAS' long-time partner on the ground in Ukraine, Right to Protection (R2P), continues to aid refugees and displaced persons. HIAS has sent emergency funding to R2P, an independent NGO, to assist their response. R2P specialists are providing legal assistance; operating a hotline to provide information about services, evacuation, and refugee status; conducting protection monitoring at checkpoints and monitoring visits to those who have not left their home; and also distributing food and supplies.
