"THE PROTESTS ON COLLEGE CAMPUSES"

Paraphrasing a famous quote by the great 20th Century American novelist, F. Scott Fitzgerald, historian Maynard Smith, in his book "Henry VIII and the Reformation," wrote, in 1948,

"A broad-minded man, who can see both sides of the question and is ready to hold opposing truths while confessing that he cannot reconcile them, is at a manifest disadvantage with a narrow-minded man, who sees but one side, sees it clearly, and is ready to interpret the whole Bible, or if need be, the whole universe, in accordance with his formula."

This quote came to mind for me, this past week, as I was watching the interview of a white Christian nationalist, who was being asked by the news interviewer, why she thought that the United States was and should be a Christian nation. Her response was as follows: "[Be]cause the United States' being a Christian nation as well as the Christian God are mentioned repeatedly in the U.S. Constitution."

When the interviewer respectfully challenged this assertion, asking her, "[A]re you sure of this," the woman, in a very condescending tone, chastised the interviewer, saying, "[T[hat's your problem, sir, had you read the U.S. Constitution, you would not have to ask me such a ridiculous question." She then pulled out her iPhone and said, [H]ere, why don't you see for yourself!"

How many times does the U.S. Constitution, in fact, mention the word "Christian" or the word "God"! Not once. In fact, the only time the word "religion" is mentioned is in the 6th Amendment, which exempts government office holders from a religious test, and in the 1st Amendment prohibits the establishment of any state religion.

In the Jewish *Mussar* Tradition, the foundational *midah*, or character trait, is *anavah*, or humility, for without humility, a person, the Tradition teaches, will likely not feel the need to look inward and be willing to acknowledge the need to grow and improve in other areas.

In my article, this month, I would like to talk about "humility" in the context of what has transpired, to date, with regard to the pro-Palestinian protests occurring on a number of college campuses in our country. I have thus asked myself, "whether I, as a Jew, a rabbi, and a strong supporter of the State of Israel, can even be objective with regard to these protests?"

As a Jew, I believe that I have a choice to make—I can follow the wisdom and teachings of our wise and venerable 2000 year old Rabbinic Tradition, which calls upon me to appreciate the complexity of life, and to recognize that no one individual, no one group, no one race, ethnicity, or religion, no one side possesses all of the "truth" or has all of the answers regarding these protests.

That none of us has all of the answers is borne out in the following representative teaching from the Talmud: Moses has just spent 40 days and nights on Mt. Sinai and has learned the Torah from God. For each legal case or issue, God has provided Moses 49 reasons to rule one way, and 49 reasons to rule another way.

Hoping to find certainty, not complexity, from the Jewish Tradition, Moses is more than a little flummoxed and cries out to God, "*Ribbono Shel Olam*, 'Master of the Universe,' [W]hat am I, what are the Jewish People to do with 98 opinions and possibilities on every subject and issue?" What Moses had not yet learned is that,

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what is most important in the Rabbinic Tradition is not so much the answer but the process followed in seeking to find the answer—the asking of questions and the listening to opposing views in an open minded and respectful manner.

I also have another way to approach these protests, one that I want to and can hopefully avoid. Rather than following the ways suggested by the Jewish Tradition, I can instead follow the approach of our contemporary secular society as demonstrated by the white Christian nationalist woman. "My position is the correct one; anyone taking a position contrary to mine is wrong." Should there be evidence supporting another position, rather than my acknowledging that there may be some merit to the other position, I will merely practice cognitive dissonance, holding on even tighter to my own position and merely ignoring the evidence supporting a different opinion or position.

While I still have numerous questions and want to learn far more before forming or taking a strong position on many of the substantive issues being discussed by the protestors and their supporters, there are several things that I do feel strongly about and want to take the risk of sharing with you. I look forward to hearing from any of you, who may agree or disagree with what I am going to say. Recognizing that the protests are an emotionally charged issue, I do ask, however, that you do so respectfully.

First, no Jewish student should be made to feel unsafe on or in the environs of a campus, and that the University administration has a duty to do all in its power to protect Jewish students from verbal or physical attack.

Second, as one who participated in a number of anti-war and civil rights protests and demonstrations, both as a lawyer and a lay person, I wish more of the protestors understood the difference between speech and expression protected on a college campus by the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution; speech intended to harm or threaten another student that is not protected under the First Amendment on a college campus; and acts of civil disobedience, such as taking over a university building and refusing to leave even after being ordered to do so by the university administration and the police--while one can stay and ignore the order, true civil disobedience honors and respects the rule of law, so that the violator has historically been willing to accept the consequences.

In 1965, the Rev. Martin Luther King, who as we all know participated in numerous acts of civil disobedience, explained how acts of civil disobedience should be undertaken: "When one breaks the law that conscience tells him is unjust, he must do so openly, he must do it cheerfully, he must do it lovingly, he must do it civilly—not uncivilly—and he must do it with a willingness to accept the penalty."

While there is more that I would like to say about the protests—perhaps, we could have a program at the synagogue on the topic—my column is already quite long, so I will bring my column to a close by describing one thing that I feel the protests could do without, and one thing that I hope will happen to enable these protests and demonstrations, rather than being primarily disruptive and divisive, to become helpful and healing.

One thing that I believe the protests could do without is politicians, whether they be Republican or Democrat, exploiting the protests for their own and their party's political gain, thus creating another divisive culture war. Nor does Prime Minister Netanyahu, with all due respect, do anything but make matters more difficult and

challenging by his having made the inflammatory comments that he did last week, calling the protestors, a number of whom are Jewish, "antisemitic mobs" and comparing the protests to "what happened in German Universities in the 1930's," when Nazi youth groups worked with Nazi security forces to carry out Hitler's genocidal agenda.

What is one thing that I hope will happen? The protesters will refrain from using polarizing and hyperbolic terms like "from the river to the sea," and "Israel is a genocidal and apartheid nation," which only serve to undermine their cause, and will instead sit down, hopefully with their Jewish classmates and together learn more about the history of and background to these terms and to the Israeli/Palestinian conflict, with both groups recognizing that no one side has all of the truth or comes to the table with totally clean hands.

If this can happen, it is my hope that all those on the campus, concerned about what happened on October 7th in Israel and what has been happening in Gaza for the past 7 months, will then be able to truly listen respectfully and with an open mind and with compassion to each other's stories, and to practice the teachings of Rev. King, so that their words and actions will be undertaken cheerfully, civilly, and with love in their hearts.

Then we, as a society, can at least come close to emulating the ways of the two great 1st century rabbis, Hillel and Shammai, who while rarely agreeing on any issue, always showed respect to the other, resulting in the Rabbis of the Talmud declaring that, even when disagreeing, both Hillel and Shammai spoke the word of God.

I would like to close my article with the following prayer:

Dear God, may these protests, rather than further dividing and polarizing those on our college and university campuses, as well as Jew and Arab and Israel and the Palestinian people, soon be infused with love and kindness, humility and compassion, and mutual respect on all sides, so that the protests can instead begin to play a salutary role in bringing about healing on the affected college campuses, a prompt and just end to the fighting in Gaza, the prompt return of the hostages to their families, freedom and renewed hope for the Palestinian people, safety and security for the State of Israel, and an end to Hamas' almost 20 year reign of terror in both Israel and Gaza.

April Brings Change

As the seasons change and Passover is upon us, we also will be seeing some changes to our physical space at CBI. If you haven't been to visit us in a while, come back during the next couple of months and see all the changes that are happening.

The first thing is we will be introducing our new library. Jill Schoenberg has been working hard getting it set up for all of us to enjoy. There will be between 400-500 of Jewish related books categorized as fiction, non-fiction and biography/memoir. Currently, we are getting them all in order on the shelf and numerically labeled. We then will have them logged into a computer database so they will be searchable on the library computer system we are repurposing from the office. We can also send out a listing to the membership so everyone will have an idea of what is available to borrow. There will be a simple check out/in process so that we can track what is out at any time.

The new computer setup in the library will not only host the library database, but it will also have the digital archives that we are establishing with various items representing the history of both Beth El and CTI and their predecessors. Some of this is further discussed below.

We have been working hard going through the items in our storage room trying to clean it out and determine what is actually in there. We have come across a number of items from Beth-El that we didn't realize we had. This is leading to the following projects:

- ☼ There is a Beth El Tree of Life that is similar to the one that CTI and CBI has. Rick Pike has taken on the project to reconstruct it and it will be put up on the wall outside of the library to balance out the CBI one on the other side. This tree has leaves and boulders representing the significant simchas and other events that occurred over the history of Beth-El.
- ☼ We found two additional large Yahrzeit plaques that are related to Anshe Shalum and we have made room for them to be hung up with all the other memorial plaques in the hallways.
- ☼ We found a lot of artwork. We have offered many of those to members or area congregations over the past year and some of them will be going up in the function room or other areas around the shul. One of these pieces may have some value and we are researching what is the best solution for that piece.
- ☼ We came across some beautiful tile artwork that was on the wall at Beth-El and also the Beth-El ark handles that are beautiful in their own right. We plan on putting both of these up on the walls in the sanctuary.
- ☼ We found the framed portraits of all the past presidents of Beth-El. We will be taking pictures of all of them and adding those to our digital library. We are looking for a volunteer who might be familiar with the Beth-El history to return as many of these pictures to relatives of the past presidents as we do not have space to put them up and no one can enjoy them sitting in a box in storage. If you can help with this, please let me know.
- ☼ We found hundreds of small brass name plates which we believe are former Beth-El members. These plates are just first and last name in English and were in big wooden cases. We made a motif of a large menorah out of them and then took digital pictures of all of them in the menorah motif which will be added to the digital archive on the computer. There are no Hebrew names or any dates on any of them so we will likely dispose of them now that we have an archive of them.
- ☼ We have found other boxes containing pictures and documents from both Beth EI and CTI. We have been distributing the boxes out to appropriate people to go thru them and save what makes sense to save, take pictures of what should be archived and dispose of items that are no longer relevant.

We have decided to freshen up our function room. We have removed all of the white boards that were on two of the walls and are in the process of picking out the paint color to paint the room over the next few weeks. We want to thank Larry Soll and Burt Ochs, who will be leading this project. We then will be adorning the new open walls with some of the artwork that we had in storage.

April Brings Change


