Lach L'cha! By Rabbi Howard Mandell



"The important role of the synagogue in ensuring a Judaism ground on *Torah, Avodah*, and *Gemillut Hasadim*!"

[I have excerpted my article this month from the *d'var torah* I gave on the second day of Rosh Hashanah.]

Why do I think the synagogue plays such a vitally important role in ensuring a vibrant and cohesive Jewish community? In addition to the fact that I am the Rabbi of a synagogue, and see firsthand the difference CBI can make in its members lives, the Talmud teaches that Judaism is grounded on 3 foundational pillars: The first is *Torah*, "Jewish learning and becoming a knowledgeable Jew." This fall, I will be teaching a class on the Torah portion of the week and on the Talmud. Additionally, we will all have the opportunity to take a class offered by CJP, called "Me'ah," to name but 2 learning opportunities.

The second pillar, *Avodah*, or "service;" which includes participating in *Tefillah*, or "Jewish prayer," taking advantage of the numerous social activities planned by the Social Committee, serving on the Board, or volunteering your time to help Janet, and yes, supporting the synagogue financially.

With the third foundational pillar being *Gemillut Hasadim*, doing acts of loving kindness, such as serving on the Social Action or CBI Cares Committee.

CBI is hopefully like a family for many of us, even more importantly, a safe and caring family. The war in Gaza and the political and human rights issues in this country have badly divided the Jewish community. Where else can we Jews disagree on these provocative issues, assured that we will do so like Hillel and Shammai, and then be able to give each other a hug and sit down to break bread together?

I thus invite each of you to share even more, in the coming year, 5786, your time, your talents, and yes, your money—for as the Talmud teaches, *ayn kemach*, *ayn torah ayn torah ayn kemach*—without bread, without the financial resources, there can be no Torah!

I want to close my article today with a *Rosh Hashanah* greeting and wish to the Jewish community from Deborah Lipstadt, who was the state department's special envoy to monitor and combat antisemitism under President Biden:

"My hope is that we Jews will respond to antisemitism by combining a relentless push against antisemites with an even more energetic pull toward our tradition in all of its manifestations. That we will respond by demonstrating pride in who we are and solidarity with others facing persecution for who they are. That the coming year will be shaped by a sincere accounting of the beauty and power and wisdom of Judaism and all of its values, in the hope that this can also serve as a model to other groups who face relentless hatred!"

MESSAGE OF THE MONTH FROM THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

As we enter October we are still in full swing of the holidays, or Chaggim. This is a time of reaching deep into our souls for self -reflection and finding ways we can turn to our better self. It is a time when we enter the Sukkah and the Ushpizin, the spirits of old, come and visit us and comfort us. It is a time we seek peace. Rabbi Mandell aptly highlights the "HaShkiveinu" prayer, we recite in each service, which speaks of the fragility of life and how grateful we are "to lie down in peace and awaken to life again as we are protected in the shelter, (Sukkah), of peace". These are some of the sentiments that bring us through these holidays together.

And yet October now has another meaning that for most of us we cannot shirk. It is the time of the horrendous Hamas attack in Israel with killing of so many civilians and capturing of hostages with a long ensuing war still raging two years later. It is a time, we as American Jews, continue to grapple with these horrific events and try to understand these times and our role in these times. If our ancestors came from Europe, North Africa, Mideast we know it is possible they could have taken a ship east or west and we too could be living in Israel and not in America. We know this is our family and we must stay loving and supportive of our family.

The question is how to keep that love, support and understanding alive. The process brings forth feelings and emotions in us spanning from pride in Israel's fortitude and Israeli's speaking out, guilt in observing extreme suffering in Gaza to sadness the hostages are still held and no end in sight. Thomas Friedman wrote an Opinion for NY times 08/31/25 entitled, "Israel's Gaza Campaign is Making it a Pariah State". In it he talks about the heinous crimes committed by Hamas and Israel, and he poses the question, "Why is the world ganging up only on Israel now?" He answers, "because it (the world) holds Israel to a higher standard than Hamas, because Israel has always held itself to a higher standard and the world can no longer look the other way". I think therein lies the rub.

In another opinion written in NY Times 9/02/25, "I Fought in Gaza. Here is Why I would Not Go Back" by Yotam Vilk. He writes, "when the scale of Hamas's massacre in Israel became clear, we went to war. The pain for those of us in the military was unbearable. The feeling that we had failed to protect our loved ones consumed me. Fueled by anger and guilt we entered combat against a ruthless terrorist organization that showed with brutal clarity the depths of its cruelty." He then goes on in detail of the military activity he took part in to try and erase Hamas and its brutality. But then a year into the war he realized, Gaza had "become a lawless zone, with little effective oversight of military and almost no personal accountability for soldiers. We came to wage a war without a timeline, without attainable goals, without an exit strategy..." On Oct 9, 2024, he and a group of other Israel Defense Force soldiers issued a public letter stating, "our service has become untenable in light of Israel's policy in Gaza and mounting evidence the government is deliberately sabotaging hostage deals". He was immediately suspended from his post. In his Opinion article, he urges reservists to refuse to serve in the war. He in fact writes many reservists are refusing. He writes "thousands have stopped showing up. Some have been sent to jail.". He finishes his article writing, "I am a Zionist. Israel has a right to repel its antagonists. I am not a pacifist and do not regret fighting. But precisely for that reason, I now understand this: To be brave today means to stop, to say "no more". With over 60,000 Palestinians, mostly civilians, dead, according to the Gazan health authorities, and with growing starvation, and Israeli hostages languishing, this war has crossed every boundary there is no longer any goal worth achieving by prolonging the war."

I am reassured in humanity when we are able to speak our minds and share our thoughts with one another, especially for such difficult issues and concerns. I think we each struggle with how we can make a difference. Over the past two years we have had some sessions when everyone at CBI was invited to meet together to express our feelings in these difficult times. These have been productive in helping us process our thoughts and enlightening in hearing each other's concerns and ideas. I invite anyone who has not come to one of these meetings to join in the future when we have another in person meeting to help us better understand together.
